Our Stewardship Team is SO THANKFUL for everyone who attended our Community Planting Party.

The Wye Marsh has been fighting the battle against Buckthorn since the 70s! Buckthorn came to North America in the 19th century, when colonial ships brought ornamental shrubs from Europe, mainly to plant as hedges. The plant quickly adapted the ability to thrive in many new conditions: from shade to bright sun, from sand to clay. Predictably, this plant escaped yards and began its menacing conquest. Over the years multiple control methods have been tried to minimal avail.

Regardless of how one eradicates Buckthorn, removal of the invader is only half the job. Having ripped out the buckthorn, the volunteers of the Wye Marsh came back to plant native species, specially designed for each area's unique micro-habitat. The Marsh will then care for the areas surrounding the new native seedlings and install tree protectors, to suppress the return of unwanted species and give the domestic trees a head start with positive hopes of bringing biodiversity back to the marsh.

And Gerrit is right! What we all do together makes a difference.



MEET RUBY Red-Eared Slider AGE: Unknown

REASON FOR LIVING AT WYE MARSH: Surrendered pet

FUN FACT: Red-Eared Sliders are not indigenous to Canada. They originate from the Mississippi River region, ranging from Illinois down to the Gulf of Mexico.

They are the most commonly kept pet turtle species and can live up to 60 years with proper care!


Sadly, many people are unaware of their long lifespan and the intensive care they require, including specialized lighting, a proper diet, and a large aquatic habitat.

Because of this, many pet turtles are neglected, surrendered, or released into the wild, where they can outcompete native species like the Midland Painted Turtle. Red-Eared Sliders are larger and more resilient, which puts pressure on our local ecosystems.


A Note on Turtle Care: While turtles like Ruby are fascinating creatures, they are not ideal pets for most people. Their long lives and complex needs make them a long-term commitment. Sadly, many captive turtles don't live even half as long as they would in the wild.

Before adopting a turtle, we encourage you to:

- Research their care thoroughly
- Consider adopting an adult turtle from a rescue
- Think long-term it's a decades-long responsibility!



Please use caution on all trails, walkways, boardwalks, waterways and property of the Wye Marsh. Appropriate hiking footwear is recommended. Slippery conditions exist when wet. Be aware that plant roots and loose rocks can create natural trip hazards when extending above paths. Immediately return to the Visitor's Centre if foul weather occurs.
