Making Connections Through Education

Working towards a sustainable environment



In Acting Today, Shaping Tomorrow – a policy framework for environmental education in schools, environmental education is considered to be not only about visible environmental issues but also about their underlying causes, and therefore places an emphasis on personal and social values and active stewardship.

Our programming strives to connect participants to nature with close consideration of this framework. From students and seniors to girl guides and english as a second language participants, our programming aims to emphasize one's role in building a sustainable environment in their backyards and beyond.

In 2013 we were able to reach more international student visitors than ever,

thanks to our new partnership with Nomad Travel, a Vancouver based tour company who offers adventure programs with a strong emphasis on educational, historical, and cultural content. This summer saw over 400 participants enjoying the majesty of our birds of prey and experiencing our beautiful wetland by voyageur canoe!

The development of 2 new program options has also made it easier for these larger groups to book an experience with us. Our Wetland Wonderers & Winter Carnival programs allow groups the flexibility to choose up to four different programs, resulting in the creation of not only memorable experiences for the participants but also educated and inspired stewards for the environment.

Also, thanks to yet another Nature Canada Explorer's grant we were able to upgrade our well-loved dip netting station with a new roof, bumper guards for the boardwalk (to protect our nets), interpretive and instructional signage and new viewing and dipping equipment. As dip netting is the highlight of any Wye Marsh visit, these improvements are sure to be enjoyed many budding biologists.

We are grateful for the ability to offer these opportunities to students in our community.

Animal Educators

Our animal educators continue to engage and inspire visitors.



This year was an exciting year for our animal educators because we had two new additions to the team. Lily, a Midland Painted Turtle was brought to us from the Ministry of Natural Resources as a rescue and is our youngest turtle. She and her new roommates, Speedy and Marsha get along swimmingly, and have all benefitted greatly from continued enrichment efforts like including live plant material in their tanks.

Kaia, an American Kestrel was donated to us by African Lion Safari. We are excited to have another indigenous bird of prey to help educate and inspire our visitors on the unique features and habitat needs of our native birds. Although Kaia is not yet being included in our education programs, she is adapting well to her new home and has become a beloved addition to the team. We plan to start including Kaia in our educational programs by the Summer of 2014.

Our birds of prey also had a new addition built for them. The new bird porch gives the birds a

place to rest and be social while getting some fresh air. This will greatly enrich their lives and we are thankful to the staff and volunteers that worked hard in building the new addition and revitalizing our existing aviaries.

As for our little pollinators, the three hives produced over 180 lbs of of honey this past fall! We were also happy to see a relatively low rate of die off in the hives this year compared to many other hives across the province, with only 1/4 dieoff. We will also be bringing back our observation hive for the display hall to allow more of our visitors the opportunity to view bees at work.



And last but not least our Captive Wildlife Care Technicians and Program Coordinator are working on developing new programs that include our birds of prey. We are hoping these new programs will inspire new and old visitors to come to the Marsh.

Renovation and Revitalization

Trail repair, habitat development and enclosure improvements


Wye Marsh has a healthy population of busy beavers; in fact this past year we had beavers that were so busy they flooded our ski trail! So this summer our maintenance team worked diligently to get the trail back to normal before the leaves started to fall. Our ski season so far this year has been great – as we were able to open the trails by December 13th and we've been keeping up as best as we can with all this snowfall we've gotten.

The birds of prey are happy to have a new "Bird Porch" where they are sheltered from the elements and predators. The bird porch was constructed this summer along with two new sheds to replace our existing Canoe and Kayak Sheds. These sheds were funded by the Helen McCrea Peacock Foundation and we are looking forward to organizing the equipment in a new fashion. Once the shed is ready for the equipment this spring we will be proud to fill it with some new lifejackets funded by ADM Cares program.

In partnership with John from JFP Industries in Orillia we are working on a new solution for our compressor system at our Swan Treatment Centre. Normally we have approximately 30 feet (diameter) open water for the swans and this winter we've had difficulties with our bubblers breaking down and as a result we only have about 8 feet (diameter) of open water. Thankfully John is providing us with advise and helping us to source and install a new system that will be able to keep even more water open for the swans!

Plans for 2014 include the completion of the replacement of two docks – funded by the Helen McCrea Peacock foundation and the completion of some enhancements to our display hall for all of our snake species – funded by the Weber Foundation. The boardwalk is in need of repairs and we are working hard to arrange help with this project as none of the Wye Marsh machinery is big enough to be able to lift the boardwalk pieces out of the water for us to administer the repairs, hopefully we will have a solution for this sometime this summer! New arrows have been


cut, painted and labeled for our ski/bike trails and we will be getting new signs in order to help orient our visitors and to replace the signs that were vandalized this year. Looking forward to seeing you out and enjoying all the facilities that Wye Marsh has to offer!


