### **DID YOU KNOW?**

**January 5 was National Bird Day**, a day to celebrate and learn more about birds, to learn more about their habitats, and to engage with citizen science initiatives.

The Wye Marsh has been designated as an Important Bird Area, also known as Important Biodiversity Area (IBA). Wye Marsh provides habitat for a number of species including common species like Cardinals and Black-capped Chickadees, along with significant species like provincially Threatened Least Bitterns, Species of Special Concern Black Terns, and the famous Trumpeter Swans (with the Wye Marsh population representing approximately 10% of the Trumpeter Swan population in the province).

#### Who designates an IBA?

IBAs are identified by BirdLife International. There are over 12,000 IBAs worldwide.

#### What are the criteria?

- Places of international significance for the conservation of birds and other biodiversity
- Recognised world-wide as practical tools for conservation
- Distinct areas amenable to practical conservation action
- Identified using robust, standardised criteria

• Sites that together form part of a wider integrated approach to the conservation and sustainable use of the natural environment

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# ON THE WILD SIDE:

First and foremost, lets be grateful for the increasing daylight, an extra 2 minutes and 7 seconds each day! The increase in daylight started on December 21, the Winter Solstice, and will continue until the Summer Solstice on June 21.

As the water freezes over in Simcoe County waterfowl who have not migrated will be in search of open water. Waterfowl like Trumpeter Swans, ducks, and geese are known to group in flocks of 70 to over 100 birds at these open water sites, like Wye Marsh, once ice forms elsewhere. These make for amazing birding opportunities!



### WELCOME KENNY!

Kenny is a male American Kestrel who has joined Wye Marsh's family of Educational Animal Ambassadors.

Kenny came to Wye Marsh from a rehabilitation centre. It was apparent from his time in the rehabilitation centre that he was a human imprint meaning he was likely someone's pet at sometime. He had no fear of humans and exhibited other traits of domestication, which unfortunately means he is not a candidate for a safe release to the wild.

Kenny is a very social little bird, who loves to flutter around his enclosure and explore new things in his environment. American Kestrels are North America's smallest falcon, comparable in size to a Blue Jay. Don't let the size fool you - American Kestrels are swift and agile hunters!

### PHASE 2 UPDATE:

In light of the restrictions announced this week, there are a few temporary changes to your next visit to Wye Marsh.

Trails will remain open from 9:00am - 4:00pm daily with the following measures in place:

- Birds of Prey Field is temporarily closed
- Workshops, kid's programming, group visits, and special events are suspended for January and February
- Cross-country ski and snowshoe rentals are suspended
- Only 1 family at a time is permitted in the Visitor Centre
- The Display Hall is currently closed

Wye Marsh is pleased to offer a discounted adult admission rate during these partial closures.

Please continue to respect signage, social distancing, and mask wearing while indoors.



# REFLECTING ON OUR YEAR



#### As we look forward to all that we aim to accomplish in 2022, we would also like to celebrate these accomplishments at Wye Marsh from 2021!

- 6,272 m<sup>2</sup> of invasive phragmites were removed by the Wye Marsh Stewardship Department in partnership with Severn Sound Environmental Association, allowing the native species to thrive.
- The Wye Marsh Animal Care department provided specialized care and enrichment for 15 raptors + 6 turtles + 2 snakes who cannot be released to the wild.
- Outdoor Educators delivered environmental educational programs for over 5,000 students, both in person and virtual.
- Outdoor educators delivered virtual classroom visits as far away as Alberta and Nunavut.
- Funding from Midland Rotary and TD Friends of the Environment Foundation allowed for the revitalization of Swan Landing to improve monitoring facilities and create an educational hub on the trails.
- Funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation allowed for the renovation of the Pavilion such that it can be used in colder and wetter weather as an outdoor classroom.
- Kim Hacker, our new Executive Director joined us in July.
- The valuable, protected habitat at Wye Marsh provided refuge for countless species, including Species at Risk and Endangered

Species, as a home, a rest area, nesting grounds, and/ or hunting grounds.


