Monarch Butterflies are some of the great migrators of the animal kingdom. In late summer/ fall these butterflies migrate ~5,000km from Canada and northeastern United States down to southwestern Mexico, then in the spring. Monarch Butterflies can travel between 80-160 km a day, so it can take up to 2 months to complete their journey one way. No one butterfly makes the whole migration cycle, instead it takes 4 generations to make the loop.

DID YOU KNOW?

Monarchs' bright orange colouring is not only beautiful - it serves as a warning to predators too! Monarchs retain a toxic steroid found in the sap of Milkweed that they consume as caterpillars. This gives them a foul taste to predators, who associate the orange colour with the taste and then avoid them. Their toxin is not deadly, but it is enough to deter predators like birds.

Sadly, Monarch Butterflies are listed as an Endangered Species. You can help by planting Milkweed, avoiding pesticides, and helping protect wild space for them to thrive and rest along their migration.

# ON THE WILD SIDE:

The wild highlight this month is the Perseid Meteor Shower - because it will be the highlight of the sky!

The Perseid Meteor Shower is an annual meteor shower that takes place in July and August. It lasts for a little over a month and every night there is a little more activity until the peak night, where it begins to slowly decrease thereafter. The peak nights for 2022 are August 11-13. On the peak nights hundreds of meteors will shoot across the night sky; approximately 80 meteors every hour. The best viewing times will be from midnight until 5:30am when the sky is the darkest. The showers are best viewed in dark and quiet places away from sources of light pollution.

The Perseid occurs when Earth flies through the cosmic trail of the Comet Swift-Tuttle. As the comet travels around pieces fall off, they enter the Earth's outer atmosphere and produce a light trail that can be viewed from Earth. A telescope is recommended, but the meteor shower can be seen by the naked eye.

If you're looking for somewhere to watch the Perseids and to learn more about them as well as other astronomy, consider attending the **Marsh by Meteor** event at Wye Marsh on August 12! It will be an evening of stargazing and counting comets on the boardwalk while learning about the moon, our solar system, stars, constellations, and more. ## A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS:

I am sure we are all noticing the same thing - that the passage of time accelerates during the summer, and decelerates during the winter! Having said that, I hope that everyone is making the most of our somewhat rambunctious summer weather.

We are continuing to grapple with the issues arising from the large number of dead and dying Ash Trees on the marsh property. Unfortunately, some of the affected areas are too large to do anything other than let nature take its course; the trees will fall in their own good time, and continue to form part of the ever-changing mosaic which is the Wye Marsh habitat. For safety reasons, affected trails have had to be closed while this process unfolds.

To counteract that, we are making strenuous efforts to improve and enhance the open trails. As always, our dedicated staff and volunteers will be happy to keep you updated with the current trail situation. I would particularly urge you to consider some of the longer trails which are typically used more for cross-country skiing in the winter, but which are perfectly walkable during the summer. My personal favourites are the outbound Red ski trail, and the Blue ski loop. Again, our Visitor Centre staff and volunteers will be happy to advise.

I wish you all safe trails, and a wonderful summer!
