

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
SPECIES Common Snapping Turtle

AGE: 36+

WHY SAM LIVES @ WYE MARSH: He was taken out of the wild in 1987 to use for education under OMNR Authorization, then transferred to the Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre in 2007.

FUN FACTS: Snapping Turtles are the largest freshwater turtle in Canada. They are considered a Species at Risk due to the loss and degradation of habitat, poaching, and road mortality. Snapping Turtles can be identified by the boney ridges on their tail called osteoderms.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Our recent weather is reminding me so much of winters in England - grey, wet, gloomy, and miserable - which is one reason why I left! Unfortunately, for reasons totally outside our control, the conditions of the snowshoeing and cross-country skiing trails are less than ideal, and will continue that way until the ground freezes. Nevertheless, our regular trail system is still perfectly accessible, and can definitely be enjoyed with a good pair of boots and maybe a stout walking stick or trekking pole. Please remember that all the ice in the Marsh is currently extremely treacherous; do not venture off the marked trails, nor let your dogs off-leash.

Thanks to the sterling efforts of our staff and volunteers, the water at Swan Landing has been kept open by bubblers, and regular feeding has ensured that there is a strong nucleus of overwintering waterfowl which you can visit and enjoy (although, like the Birds of Prey enclosure, we do ask that you not bring your dogs into this area).

The days are getting longer again - come and enjoy your ever-changing Wye Marsh!

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### IT'S TIME TO NEST!

Of the five owl species that are native to our area, Great Horned Owls are the earliest nesters, and usually start the process in early February.

The first step is to establish their territory, which is why you might notice that there are a lot more owl calls this time of year. (Both the males and females are very vocal!)

Just like with people, this species likes to "check out the neighbourhood" when selecting a place to call home. They like to scope out potential

sites before others migrate back to the area. This makes it easier to steal nests, because when the previous owners arrive and see the "Tigers of the Sky" have moved in... they simply go elsewhere to avoid conflict.





Great Horned Owl pairs may roost together near possible nesting sites for months before laying eggs.

They prefer nests used by other large birds like hawks, crows or herons. However, an inviting tree cavity, owl box, platform, broken off tree stump, or even a windowsill flower box will also suffice.

While some birds' reproductive cycles are influenced by temperature or time of year, these factors don't seem to have any impact on Great Horned Owls. Instead, they have their own biological clock that dictates when it is time to start looking for a mate. Great Horned Owls are the largest owl species in Ontario. It takes them longer to incubate their eggs and raise their young, which might also explain why they start the process earlier than other owls.

Their eggs are about the size of a tennis ball, and there are usually 3-4 per "clutch". Once they hatch, in mid-March, the chicks are about the size of a soft ball. Just one month later - the owlets reach their full size, but they still depend on their parents for food. By Autumn, they are ready to spread their wings and leave the nest.

## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

As a life-long environmental activist, Cate Root knows how important it is to protect Wye Marsh. "It cleans our water, provides habitat for fish and wildlife, and it's beautiful!" she declares. We are all connected in this web of life and being part of an active caring community can be so rewarding.

Cate loves facilitating "wow" moments for visitors to Wye Marsh, as a Front Desk Volunteer, and keeping them up to date on the latest sightings, as well as the organization's special events and workshops.

She also enjoys helping us out by volunteering at special events, roasting Bannock, and has led the occasional guided hike, too. Last year, while taking a birding ID workshop, she was amazed to see freshly hatched snapping turtles on the berm. They were only about an inch in size, she says, "I had no idea. They were so vulnerable."

Protecting the environment and building health communities is really important to Cate.

She remembers when Friends of Wye Marsh was planning the official opening for the main boardwalk. It was around the same time the Township of Tay was planning to host its "Tay Bike Day". Cate suggested the two organizations work together, and hold their events the same day to generate a little media attention. Synchronizing the dates worked beautifully, as Glen Murray, then Minister of Environment and Climate Change, decided to attend!

However she can help, Cate is ready to take action.

Cate sits on the South Georgian Bay Lake Simcoe Source Water Protection Region Committee, coordinates a Breakfast Club for children in Coldwater, and volunteers with Huronia Hospice as well as the Huronia Community Foundation and Human Voice Bank. She loves volunteering because, "It's always neat to learn new things... and use new skills."



Last year, she was one of a handful of people who braved the cold wet rain on Earth Day, to help out with a restoration planting project along the Return Trail at Wye Marsh. "I didn't know you could just stick those (Willow and Dogwood cuttings) in the ground, and they would grow," she said. It was a revelation she shared with family. "I told my daughter, and now she is doing it on her farm," reclaiming even more natural habitat for wildlife.

"That's the beauty of volunteering. You learn a whole lot of new skills!" said Cate.

And WE learn a lot from you, too, Cate. Actually, we are quite lucky at Wye Marsh. We learn a lot from all our volunteers. For that we say, "Thank you!"

# WYE MARSH BUCKTHORN UPDATE

You might have noticed a lot of blue marks on saplings at Wye Marsh, and wondered what is going on. Well, we have hired "Restoration Artists: The Invasive Species Experts" to help us address our Buckthorn issue - because they are committed to improving the environment and helping native ecosystems thrive.

European Buckthorn is a fast-spreading transformer species that out-competes native vegetation for sun by leafing out earlier, and holding onto its foliage longer. They also reduce biodiversity by secreting chemicals that actually inhibit the growth of other plants, and they cause changes in soil nitrogen. Simply put, Buckthorn is destroying marsh habitat and food sources for local wildlife.

Removing this damaging species is essential to the long-term health of the Wye Marsh. That is why Restoration Artists are hand-painting Buckthorn saplings with the herbicide Garlon RTU to kill them this winter. It is a very targeted process, and low impact strategy.








SPRING INSPIRED STONE CARVING





Please use caution on all trails, walkways, boardwalks, waterways and property of the Wye Marsh. Appropriate hiking footwear is recommended. Slippery conditions exist when wet. Be aware that plant roots and loose rocks can create natural trip hazards when extending above paths. Immediately exit the trails if foul weather conditions threaten.
