June is National Indigenous Peoples Month, with June 21 being National Indigenous Peoples Day. During these celebrations and always its important to recognize the incredible contributions of Indigenous Peoples to Canada's history and culture.

Canoes are an icon of Canada. The canoe's construction was perfected by the Indigenous peoples of Canada. The Algonquin of the eastern woodlands are most closely associated with the style of birch bark canoe familiar today. The term canoe comes from root words in Indigenous languages.

Canoes are one of the most wetland friendly modes of transportation. They are quiet, making them great for not disturbing wildlife and allowing you to immerse yourself in nature. They are paddle powered, meaning they don't leak harmless oils or other harmful fluids into a valuable wetland environment. They also have a low draw, meaning they can get into shallow areas of a wetland to explore.



# ON THE WILD SIDE:

The marsh is brimming with excitement! Turtles, frogs, waterfowl, insects, mammals, snakes, and raptors are all afoot at Wye Marsh basking in the sunshine, swimming the channels, and singing in the woodlands. This vibrancy makes for a wonderful time to take a hike (or a few) along the trails. With so much to look for, we've created a summer spotting list of some of the species who fund refuge in the valuable wetland habitat that Wye Marsh protects. ### HOW TO ID POISON IVY

"Leaves of three leave it be" is a helpful reminder when thinking of Poison Ivy. The plant grows with leaf clusters of 3 that are each 5 - 10 cm long. Leaves are red/ green in the spring, are bright green in summer, and turn red or yellow in the fall, and have a glossy/ oily top. Stems have a slightly fuzzy appearance, and are reddish in colour. Plants generally grow 30-50 cm tall and will vine around trees.

Poison Ivy is a very adaptable plant that can be found nearly anywhere in Ontario from deep forests to wetlands to sandy areas to gardens. Be on the lookout, and consider long pants or high socks and washing your hiking gear after each outing to avoid the itchy reaction that occurs when the oils come into contact with skin.
