CONSERVATION CORNER – INVASIVE BUCKTHORN MANAGEMENT


Over the past year, Friends of Wye Marsh (FOWM) has begun ramping up management of woody stem invasive shrubs; primarily Glossy Buckthorn, Common Buckthorn and Tatarian Honeysuckle. The efforts are part of a ten-year plan developed by the Wye Marsh Stewardship Department and Canadian Wildlife Services to prevent the spread and introduction of invasive plants, and preserve the important habitats present at the Marsh.

The most dominant shrub at the Marsh, Glossy Buckthorn (*Frangula alnus*), is a tall deciduous shrub originating from Eurasia. It was introduced to Canada in the late 1800's primarily in agricultural areas for fencerows and windbreaks. It spreads quickly with the help of birds and animals that eat its fruit and can thrive in a wide range of soil & light conditions, enabling it to invade a variety of habitats.

At Wye Marsh, Glossy Buckthorn accounts for 60-70% of the understory on many of the trails. Staff and volunteers have led small-scale management efforts over the past decade with mixed results. The primary management technique to this point has been mechanical removal, using weed wrenches, shovels, and good ol' elbow grease to physically pull the plants from the ground. In a small area, these strategies can be very effective, but need a consistent effort to deplete the seed bank. Part of the challenge at Wye Marsh is the sheer scale of the invasion, with most of the 47-hectare National Wildlife Area (NWA) hosting some invasive buckthorn.

To help get the tenacious plant under control, FOWM will be bringing in Restoration Artists, a company that specializes in invasive species management and ecosystem restoration. Over the winter, buckthorn will be removed from 3-5 hectares around the Hardwood & Return Trails, with herbicide being applied directly to harvested stumps. In the spring, staff and volunteers will continue pulling invasive seedlings until the seedbank is exhausted. After much of the buckthorn is gone from an area, remediation efforts will begin in earnest. Native wildflower seeds will be spread across the managed area and cuttings from beneficial native shrubs such as willows, dogwoods, and alders will be planted.

In subsequent years of the project, the management process will continue systematically across the remainder of the NWA. FOWM will be recruiting volunteers to help in the management and remediation process, with positions ranging from buckthorn pulling to native shrub planting.
